SPARE PARTS LIST - 12/31/10

This spare parts list was put together at the 2010 Rendezvous and is not intended to be all encompassing but should provide a good beginning to your spare parts list for your particular boat. - Cummins (or Volvo or any other engine type you may have) part kit (full, midrange) and generator parts kit
- Engine manual & part books, Lewis Marine Group and/or West Marine Catalog, Boatowner's Mechanical and Electrical Manual—Nigel Calder
- Impeller kit with gaskets (puller or bolt if needed)
- Belts: main engine and generator
- Extra hoses and water pump at your discretion
- Alternator (only for remote cruising)
- Rescue (self-fusing) tape to repair hoses
- Racor or equivalent filters: oil, fuel (engine and remote filter). Don't forget generator filters
- Thermostat (engine and generator)
- SS hose clamps of various sizes (check with magnet to make sure they are really nonmagnetic)
- Duct tape
- ReSeal kit for raw water pump
- Fuel solenoid (for pre common rail engines)
- Gasket making material (paper & liquid)
- Toilet rebuild kit
- Spare bulbs for all lights (navigation, including compass, and house
- At least one fuse of each type used onboard, including inline fuses for VHF, stereo, etc. Check manuals. Also check back of breaker panels.
- Spare breaker
- Lengths of common cable types
- Electrical connector kit

- Bilge pump (and float switch if not integral)
- VHF antenna connectors
- Fresh water pump or repair kit (or a way to use washdown pump as a backup
- Teflon tape
- Zincs for engine, rudder, shaft, and bow/sternthruster
- Hand-held VHF and GPS
- RV style water filter for freshwater refills
- Re-arming kit for inflatable life jackets
- Sealants
- Underwater epoxy

- Metric and standard socket sets
- Metric and standard wrenches
- Basic hand tools: hammer, screwdrivers and bits (include a square drive sizes), adjustable wrench, pliers, wire cutters, adjustable wrench, Vise-grips, filter wrench, razor knife, hacksaw and blades
- Cordless drill and drill bits
- Dremel tool and accessories (no boat is complete without one)
- Battery powered drill
- Electrical crimpers
- Soldering iron and solder
- Multi-meter (know how to use it)
- Strainer wrench or large slip joint pliers

If you bring a tool from home for a job on the boat, consider whether you should keep one on board (or keep a list of tools to bring on a cruise)

As an alternative to the above, you can just bring a satellite phone and a credit card with a big limit.

And don't forget, if you use a spare, replace it. If you buy a new piece of equipment, get the spares you might need at the same time.
